Introduction and Background Information:

To comply with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits for its wastewater treatment plants, the City established an Industrial Pretreatment Program (IPP). This program ensures that industries operating within the City comply with Clean Water Act standards, thereby protecting both the City's wastewater treatment facilities and the Mississippi River. The IPP is authorized under Chapter 16, Article IV – Industrial Wastes of the City of Rock Island Code of Ordinances (the Ordinance), granting the City the legal authority to enforce federal regulations.

As part of the initial development of the IPP, the City was required to establish plant-specific pollutant discharge limits, known as Local Limits. These Limits are designed to prevent both pass-through of pollutants and interference with the treatment plant processes.

A Special Condition in the NPDES permits for both the Mill Street and Southwest treatment plants requires the City to periodically review—and, if necessary, update—the Limits outlined in Section 16-301 of the Sewer Use Ordinance. In response, City staff conducted sampling within the collection system to collect the data needed to evaluate whether the current Limits continued to be protective of the treatment processes.

The results of the evaluation indicated that the existing Limits were more stringent than those calculated using the updated data.

Before any changes to the Limits can be implemented, they must first be approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA). The City formally submitted a proposal to the USEPA recommending that the existing Limits remain unchanged. After reviewing the proposal, the USEPA approved it with one modification: the removal of two pollutants—Barium and Hexavalent Chromium—that had previously been listed with a “No Limit” designation. The USEPA explained that maintaining a “No Limit” designation could hinder the City's ability to take enforcement action if these pollutants were to appear in discharges, as the language could be misinterpreted as establishing a permissible level. These deletions are indicated in red.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 16 ARTICLE IV SECTION 16-301
“SPECIFIC POLLUTANT LIMITATIONS”
OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE FOR THE CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS:

WHEREAS, the Illinois Municipal Code, 65 ILCS 5/1-2-1, provides that the corporate authorities of each municipality may pass all ordinances and make all rules and regulations proper or necessary, to carry into effect the powers granted to municipalities, with such fines or penalties as may be deemed proper; and

WHEREAS, the City of Rock Island is a home rule unit of government pursuant to Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Illinois Constitution and, pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6 of Article VII, may exercise any power or perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, City staff has reviewed Chapter 16, Article IV, Sec. 16-301 of the Rock Island Code of Ordinances, and desires to make changes to the Code to comply with plant-specific pollutant discharge limits approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS as follows:

Section 1. That Chapter 16, Article IV, Sec. 16-301 “Specific Pollutant Limitations” of the Rock Island Code of Ordinances is amended by as attached to this Ordinance;

Section 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed insofar as they do so conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage and approval, as required by law

Introduction and Background Information:

Staff received a request from Devin and Travis Morrison, owners of 1861 46th Street, to vacate a segment of 20th Avenue. The requested area to be vacated is 12' by approximately 132' between 46th Street and a north-south alleyway adjacent to the City's border with Moline. They are requesting the vacation due to concerns regarding parking and pedestrian traffic near their property, and the desire for additional yard space to possibly build a garage. If approved, the remaining segment of 20th Avenue would become an alleyway and there would be no parking allowed.

Coinciding with this request, staff propose changing the directional flow of the north-south alleyway that serves the block of houses east of 46th from a two-way to a one-way. This alleyway is currently barricaded at the south end next to the Morrison's property and has approximately 8 feet of pavement. Given the narrowness of the paved area, staff recommend removing the barricade to allow north-to-south one-way traffic, with an exit at the intersection of 20th Avenue and 46th Street. The attached map illustrates this change with arrows showing the proposed traffic flow.

Analysis of Impact

Staff notified adjacent property owners, including all the properties that would be affected by the proposed alleyway change. The only objection came from Mr. Robert Murphy at 2001 46th Street. He raised concerns that no parking on 20th Avenue would create parking congestion on 46th Street as well as concerns about additional through traffic by removing the alleyway barricade. Staff note that 46th Street north of 20th Avenue only has parking on the west side, but have not observed any parking congestion there. All houses on that block have off-street parking. Additionally, staff do not foresee an issue with additional through traffic as most of the neighboring businesses in Moline have already blocked access to the alleyway.

Further, local utility companies were contacted. The requested vacation will not negatively impact their services nor any City services.

Lastly, the Morrisons previously requested a vacation of the entirety of 20th Avenue south of

their property. This request was denied, but the City Council directed staff to explore other options. Staff believe this option is a good compromise to provide the Morrisons with more yard space while also improving connectivity and circulation in the neighborhood. Their parcel is platted at 28 feet wide while the rest of the parcels on the block are 40 feet wide. Vacating 12 feet to their parcel would create consistency.

Previous Council Action (if any):

- 2007: The City Council approved a vacation request from Mr. Murphy at 2001 46th Street for the south 10 feet of 20th Avenue.
- 2024: The City Council denied a vacation request from Travis Morrison of 1861 46th Street for the entire segment of 20th Avenue south of that property.

Budget Impact:

- The budget impact is minimal. Vacating segments of right-of-way reduces long-term maintenance costs. There will be some minor costs to make and install signage for alleyway directional change and no parking.

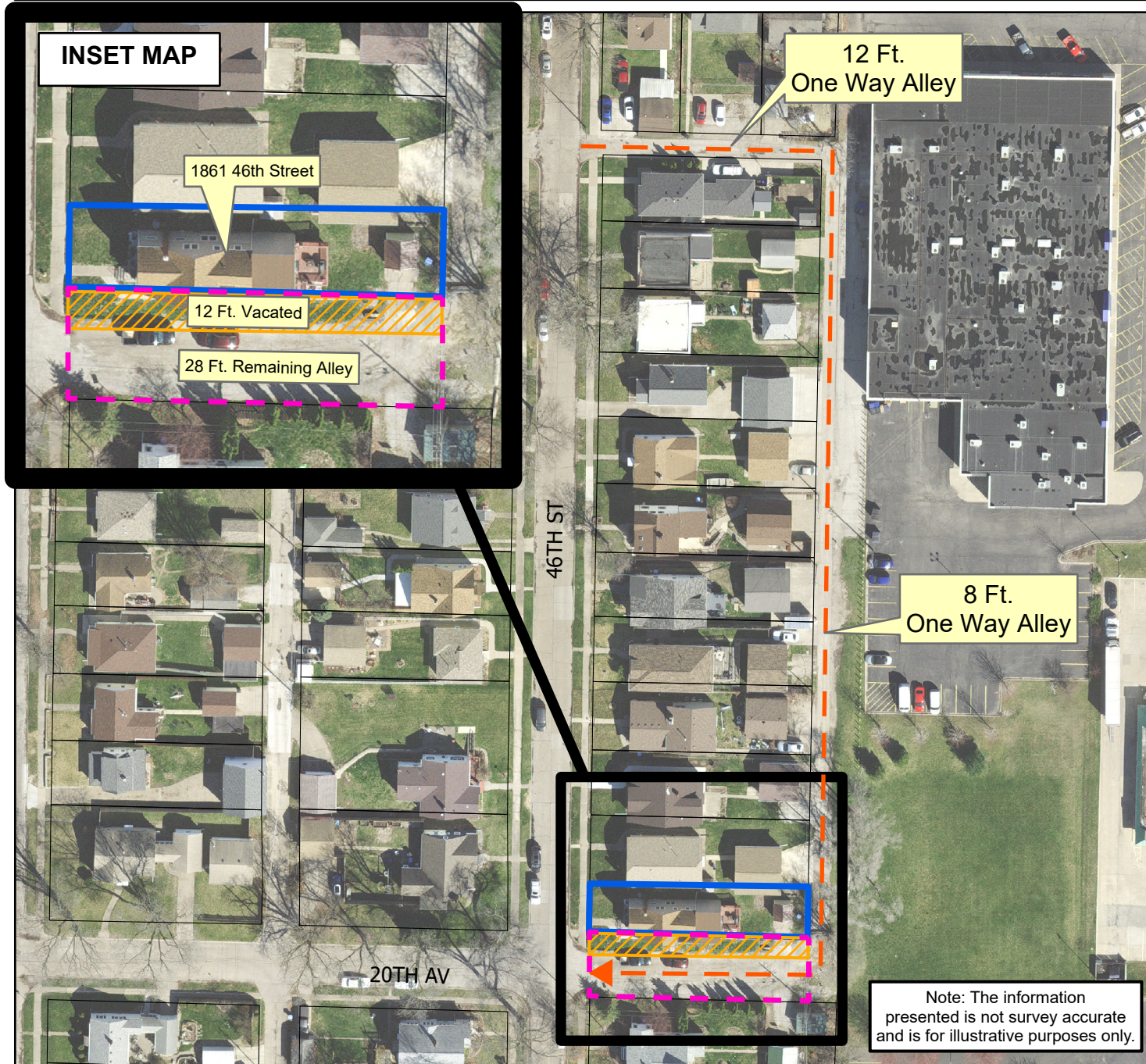

**A SPECIAL ORDINANCE VACATING A SECTION OF PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY
IN THE CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCK ISLAND,
ILLINOIS:

Section One: That a section of public right-of-way in the City of Rock Island, Illinois be and is hereby vacated, reserving, however, unto the City of Rock Island or unto any public utility, all right, title, and interest said City or utility may now have in any public service facility or property now located in said right-of-way herein described, and a right-of-way and easement for such public utility and property, and also reserving unto said City or public utility the right to maintain, renew, enlarge, extend, or reconstruct any and all such public service facilities or property. That said section of an alleyway in the City of Rock Island is described as follows:

A segment of public right-of-way beginning at the southwest corner of 1861 46th Street (PIN 1706309028), then heading east along the south property line of said parcel to its southeast corner, then heading directly south 12 feet, then heading directly west to the east right-of-way line of 46th Street, then north 12 feet to the point of beginning.

Section Two: That the entirety of the above described vacated right-of-way section be and is hereby conveyed to Devin and Travis Morrison as the owners of the adjacent parcel with PIN 1706309028 and commonly known as 1861 46th Street.

Section Three: That the City Clerk of the City of Rock Island, Illinois shall file a certified copy of this ordinance for record in the Office of the Recorder of Deeds in and for Rock Island County, Illinois. All costs for recording shall be paid by the beneficiary landowners to the transition.

Section Four: All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed insofar as they do so conflict.

Section Five: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval, as required by law.

This item was originally presented to Council for a first reading in December 2024 and was tabled until the second May meeting.

The solid waste fund is reviewed annually during the budget process and a fee adjustment will need to be made to the residential refuse and yard waste services in order for the fund to balance. The rate increase will be applied to residential refuse service and yard waste service. The last rate increase was in 2018.

The following rate increase is proposed:

2025: 8.5% refuse service rate increase

Residential Refuse Service (monthly):

\$11.00 to \$11.95

Yard Waste (annual):

\$100 to \$108.50

Yard Waste Cart Rental (annual):

\$50 to \$54.25

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS:

WHEREAS, the Illinois Municipal Code, 65 ILCS 5/1-2-1, provides that the corporate authorities of each municipality may pass all ordinances and make all rules and regulations proper or necessary, to carry into effect the powers granted to municipalities, with such fines or penalties as may be deemed proper; and

WHEREAS, the City of Rock Island is a home rule unit of government pursuant to Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Illinois Constitution and, pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6 of Article VII, may exercise any power or perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, City staff has reviewed Chapter 13, Article II, Sec. 13-25 of the Rock Island Code of Ordinances, and desires to make changes to the Code;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 13, Article II, Sec. 13-25 “Collection; Removal Generally” of the Rock Island Code of Ordinances is hereby removed and replaced in its entirety as follows:

Sec. 13-25. Collection; Removal Generally:

The Public Works Department shall provide solid waste collection and disposal services to residential properties in Rock Island with four (4) or fewer dwelling units as described in the residential solid waste disposal rules. Effective July 1, 2026, the refuse charge shall be eleven dollars and ninety-five cents (\$11.95) per month, per dwelling unit. Residential properties with more than four (4) dwelling units may elect to receive solid waste and disposal services from the Public Works Department or make alternate arrangements. If the services provided by the Public Works Department are used, effective July 1, 2026, the refuse charge shall be eleven dollars and ninety-five cents (\$11.95) per month, per dwelling unit. (Ord. 057-2017, 12-18-2017; Ord. 036-2019, 7-8-2019)

Yard Waste. Yard waste shall be collected separately from household garbage per state law and it shall be a violation of this article for any person to intentionally place or comingle, at any time, yard waste of any kind with any other household refuse or

recyclable materials prepared for collection. An annual fee of one hundred eight dollars and fifty cents (\$108.50) will be charged to cover disposal of contents.

Section 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed insofar as they do so conflict.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage and approval, as required by law, however, the change in the residential refuse rate and annual yard waste fee will take effect as of July 1, 2025.

Introduction and Background Information:

On April 08, 2024, City Council passed an Ordinance creating the Street Improvement Utility and Street Improvement Fund. The City provided for an appeals process for property owners who believe that their parcels were not properly assessed in determining the size of their parcel.

The City is desirous of expanding the appeals process to better reflect the intent of the Ordinance. The amendments to the appeals process will enable a property owner to file an appeal with the Director of Public Works and request an exemption or reduction in the utility fee if they meet one of two bases for appeal:

- (1) Road Exemption - If the parcel is accessed by not traversing across any City-owned roads, such as through private or County roads; or
- (2) Service Charge - If the parcel area was miscalculated.

Further amendments include acceptable documentation for the appeal, a mechanism to revoke an exemption, and a non-refundable payment provision for charges paid prior to the filing of the appeal.

Previous Council Action (if any):

On April 08, 2024, the Ordinance establishing the Street Improvement Utility Fee and Fund was adopted.

On November 25, 2024, Council appealed the Motor Fuel Tax due to the creation of the Street Improvement Utility Fee.

Budget Impact:

The number of parcels in the City which may be eligible for an appeal is expected to be minimal and to not jeopardize the sustainability of the Street Improvement Fund.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 16, ARTICLE I,
SECTION 16-8, “APPEALS,” BY REPEALING SECTION 16-8 IN ITS ENTIRETY AND
ENACTING A NEW SECTION 16-8.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS:

WHEREAS, the Illinois Municipal Code, 65 ILCS 5/1-2-1, provides that the corporate authorities of each municipality may pass all ordinances and make all rules and regulations proper or necessary, to carry into effect the powers granted to municipalities, with such fines or penalties as may be deemed proper; and

WHEREAS, the City of Rock Island is a home rule unit of government pursuant to Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Illinois Constitution and, pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6 of Article VII, may exercise any power or perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, City staff has reviewed Chapter 16, Article I, Section 16-8, “APPEALS” of the Rock Island Code of Ordinances, and desires to make changes to the Code to better reflect City Council goals for the City of Rock Island;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained, by the CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOLIS as follows:

Section 1. That Chapter 16, Article I, Section 16-8, “APPEALS” of the Rock Island Code of Ordinances is amended by repealing Section 16-8 in its entirety and enacting a new Section 16-8, entitled “APPEALS”, as attached to this Ordinance;

Section 2. Repeal of Conflicting Provisions. All ordinances, resolutions, and policies or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of the conflict, expressly repealed on the effective date of this Ordinance.

Section 3 Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance is ruled unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Ordinance that can be given effect without the invalid application or provision, and each invalid provision or invalid application of this Ordinance is severable.

Section 4. The clerk is directed by the corporate authorities to publish this Ordinance in pamphlet form. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage.

Sec. 16-8. Appeals.

(a) Property Owners are eligible for the following Appeals:

- (1) Road Exemption: A property owner must demonstrate that access to the subject parcel is achieved exclusively via privately owned roads, non-city-maintained easements, or roads maintained by a governmental entity other than the City of Rock Island, and that City roads are not accessed at all in order to gain access to the parcel. The fact that a property is surrounded by exempt roads does not satisfy the elements of this appeal, if the property owner uses City owned roads to access these exempt roads.
- (2) Service Charge: A property owner may file a service charge appeal if they believe the gross area of their property has been miscalculated.

(b) Filing Requirement: An appeal must be filed in writing with the Public Works Director and include the following documentation for each appeal:

(1) Road Exemption:

- (i) A notarized statement from the property owner describing the means of access to the parcel;
- (ii) A site plan showing access points and the roads or easements used; and
- (iii) Any additional supporting documentation confirming that the roads are not owned by the City of Government including but not limited to, recorded easements, road maintenance agreements, and Deeds of Record.

(2) Service Charge: A survey prepared by a registered land surveyor or professional engineer containing information on the gross area of the property.

- (c) Using the information provided by the appellant, the Director of Public Works shall review the submitted documentation and request additional documentation as necessary. A written decision shall be issued within sixty (60) days of receipt of a complete appeal submission.
- (d) In response to an appeal, the Director of Public Works may adjust or exempt the Street Improvement Utility service charge and any late payment penalties applicable to a property in conformance with the general purpose and intent of this article. The appellant shall not be entitled to any reimbursement of funds for any fees paid prior to the submission of their appeal.
- (e) A decision of the Director of Public Works that is adverse to an appellant may be appealed to the City Manager within thirty (30) days of receipt of notice of the adverse decision. The appeal must be filed in writing with the City Manager by the appellant and include a detailed explanation of the grounds for the appeal. The City Manager shall issue a written decision on the appeal within sixty (60) days.
- (f) Any appeal of the decision of the City Manager must be made pursuant to the Illinois Administrative Review Act, 735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq. (Ord. 18-2024, 4-8-2024)
- (g) Exemptions granted under this section are subject to periodic review and may be revoked if the means of access to the parcel changes or if parcels are combined to increase the gross area of the parcel.

Introduction and Background Information:

In December 2022, the City Council adopted a six-month moratorium on new vape shops due to concerns about the number of vape products, flavored tobacco products and shops in the City.

In June 2023, the City Council passed an ordinance amending Article XVIII Sale/Possession of Tobacco Products, which included the creation of Class A and Class B licenses and revised and added definitions.

In October 2024, the City Council adopted another resolution issuing a moratorium on vape shops after continued concerns about the number of vape products and shops in the City. Staff were also directed to investigate hemp-derived THC products and the possibility of a flavored tobacco ban.

Summary of Proposed Tobacco Ordinance Changes:

1. Amendments and Additions to Tobacco Definitions: The proposed amendments to the City's tobacco ordinance include updating and adding terminology and language that mirror other Illinois cities that have been proactive in addressing the sale and use of tobacco and vape-related products. The changes introduce or revise definitions for: Tobacco products, vaping devices, tobacco accessories, alternative nicotine products and smoking herbs. These updates ensure the ordinance clearly distinguishes between different types of tobacco products and delivery methods, making it more understandable and easier to enforce.
2. License Limitations: Currently, Rock Island has 36 Class A licenses and 4 Class B licenses. The ordinance proposes capping Class A tobacco licenses (general retail/incidental) at 30 and Class B tobacco licenses (tobacco specialty shops) at 2.
3. Vaping Product Restrictions
 - The ordinance strengthens restrictions on vaping product sales, aligning with approaches taken by other municipalities.
 - The threshold for distinguishing Class A and Class B licenses is revised: Class

A: Less than 50% of total sales derived from tobacco-related items and less than 20% of floor/display space allocated to tobacco products, tobacco accessories, vaping and alternative tobacco products. Class B: More than 50% of total sales from tobacco-related products or 20% or more of floor/display space dedicated to these products. The current ordinance does not have a threshold for floor and display space and the sales threshold is currently set at 80%.

4. Fee Adjustments: Based on research of comparable cities, license fees should increase (proposed) as follows: Class A: From \$150 to \$175 annually and Class B: From \$250 to \$300 annually

5. Updated and Expanded Language

- Outdated language from the 1990s has been removed.
- The ordinance explicitly includes tobacco accessories, vaping devices, and alternative nicotine products in the prohibition of sales to individuals under 21.
- Council will have the authority to increase the number of licenses under each class if necessary.

ORDINANCE NO. - 2025

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ROCK ISLAND COUNTY, ILLINOIS, AMENDING ARTICLE XVIII SALE/POSSESSION OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS, **TOBACCO ACCESSORIES, VAPE DEVICES, SMOKING HERBS AND ALTERNATIVE NICOTINE PRODUCTS**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCK ISLAND, ILLINOIS:

Sec. 8-486. Definitions:

For the purposes of this article, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them:

“Alternative nicotine product” means a product or device not consisting of or containing tobacco that provides for the ingestion into the body of nicotine, whether by chewing, smoking, absorbing, dissolving, inhaling, snorting, sniffing, or by any other means. “Alternative nicotine product” does not include: cigarettes as defined in Section 1 of the Cigarette Tax Act [35 ILCS130/1] and tobacco products as defined in Section 10-5 [35 ILCS 143/10-5] of the Tobacco Products Tax Act of 1995; tobacco product and electronic cigarette as defined in this Section; or any product approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for that approved purpose.

“Electronic cigarette” means:

- (1) any device that employs a battery or other mechanism to heat a solution or substance to produce a vapor or aerosol intended for inhalation;
- (2) any cartridge or container of a solution or substance intended to be used with or in the device or to refill the device; or
- (3) any solution or substance, whether or not it contains nicotine intended for use in the device.

“Electronic cigarette” includes, but is not limited to, any electronic nicotine delivery system, electronic cigar, electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe, electronic hookah, vape pen, or similar product or device, any components or parts that can be used to build the product or device, and any component, part, or accessory of a device used during the operation of the device, even if the part or accessory was sold separately. “Electronic cigarette” does not include: cigarettes as defined in Section 1 of the Cigarette Tax Act; tobacco product and alternative nicotine product as defined in this Section; any product approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for that approved purpose; any asthma inhaler prescribed by a physician for that condition and is being marketed and sold solely for that approved purpose; any device that meets the definition of cannabis paraphernalia under Section 1-10 of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act [410 ILCS 705/1-10]; or any cannabis product sold by a dispensing organization pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act [410 ILCS 705/1-1 et seq.] or the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act [410 ILCS 130/1 et seq.].

“Nicotine” means any form of the chemical nicotine, including any salt or complex, regardless of whether the chemical is naturally or synthetically derived.

“Smoking herbs” means all substances of plant origin and their derivatives, including but not limited to broom, calea, California poppy, damiana, hops, ginseng, lobelia, jimson weed and other members of the

Datura genus, passion flower and while lettuce, which are processed or sold primarily for use as smoking materials.

“Tobacco accessories” means cigarette papers, pipes, bongs, holders of smoking materials of all types, cigarette rolling machines, and other items, designed primarily for the smoking, inhaling, or ingestion of tobacco products, alternative nicotine products or other substances.

“Tobacco product” means any product containing or made from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, including, but not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, little cigars, chewing tobacco, pipe tobacco, snuff, snus, and any other smokeless tobacco product which contains tobacco that is finely cut, ground, powdered, or leaf and intended to be placed in the oral cavity. “Tobacco product” includes any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product, whether or not sold separately. “Tobacco product” does not include: an alternative nicotine product as defined in this Section; or any product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for that approved purpose.

“Vape Devices” means “Vapes,” Vape Pens,” or “alternative vapor transmission modalities” that are electronically-operated devices which contain a cartridge or open space filled with nicotine and/or other chemicals which are turned into vapor or steam that inhaled and exhaled.

“Vending Machine”: Any mechanical, electric or electronic, self-service device which, upon insertion of money, tokens or any other form of payment, dispenses tobacco products, alternative nicotine products or any electronic nicotine device. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996)

Sec. 8-487. License Required.

(1) It shall be unlawful to sell or offer for sale at retail, to give away, deliver or to keep with the intention of selling at retail, giving away or delivering any products regulated by this Chapter. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996); 2023???. No license shall be issued for the sale of tobacco products, vaping devices, tobacco accessories or alternative nicotine products at any location within one hundred feet (100') from the property boundaries of any school. It shall be unlawful to permit smoking, vaping, or otherwise ingesting any tobacco, electronic cigarette, or alternative nicotine products on the premises at an establishment which also sells tobacco, electronic cigarettes, vaping devices, tobacco accessories or alternative nicotine products without first obtaining a Class A or Class B license.

(2) A license shall be purely a personal privilege and shall not constitute property, nor shall it be subject to attachment, garnishment or execution; nor shall it be alienable or transferable, voluntarily or involuntarily, or subject to being encumbered or hypothecated. ~~Such license shall not descend by the laws of testate or intestate devolution, but it shall cease upon the death of the licensee.~~

Sec. 8-488. Licensing Procedure, Types of Licenses and Fees:

There shall be two categories of tobacco dealer's licenses, Applications are available with the Office of the in writing to the City Clerk on a form(s) provided by the City Clerk's Office. The license shall expire on April 30 each year. If a license fee is received late, the license holder may be subject to a late fee of 10% of the invoiced license fee and may be subject to renewal license being denied.

(1) Class A License (Incidental): Class A licenses are required in order to engage in the retail sale and/or display of tobacco products, tobacco accessories, electronic cigarettes, vaping devices

or alternative nicotine products where such sales and displays are incidental to the principal use of the premises, such as a grocery store or convenience store, which devotes less than twenty (20) percent of its floor space or display area to such products and which derives less than fifty (50) percent of its gross revenue from the sale of tobacco products, tobacco accessories, electronic cigarettes, vaping devices or alternative nicotine products. The annual license fee for Class A shall be one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$175.00), payable in accordance with this Chapter. The total number of Class A licenses to be issued is thirty (30).

- (2) Class B (Retail Tobacco Shop/Store). Class B licenses are required in order to engage in the retail sale and/or display of tobacco products, tobacco accessories, electronic cigarettes, vaping devices or alternative nicotine products where such sales and displays are a primary use of the premises such as a tobacco shop, which devotes more than twenty (20) percent of its floor space or display area to such products OR which derives more than fifty (50) percent of its gross revenue from the sale of tobacco products, tobacco accessories, electronic cigarettes, vaping devices or alternative nicotine products. The annual license fee for Class B shall be three hundred dollars (\$300.00), payable in accordance with this Chapter. The total number of Class B licenses to be issued is two (2).

The restrictions on the number of licenses shall not limit the right to renewal of any existing license nor to the issuance of a license to the purchase of an established licensed business as an going concern, but as licenses are revoked, expire without renewal, or for any other reason cease to exist, the total number of tobacco licenses in that class will be reduced until the cap on the class is met.

Exceptions to Limits: The City Council may, in their discretion, grant the creation of an additional license in either class, if, it is found that the creation of such license is necessary for the public convenience of the residents of Rock Island and is in the best interest of the City of Rock Island.

Sec. 8-489. Responsibility For Agents And Employees:

(a) Every act or omission of whatsoever nature, constituting a violation of any of the provisions of this article by an officer, director, manager or other agent or employee of any licensee shall be deemed and held to be the act of such licensee; and such licensee shall be punishable in the same manner as if such act or omission had been done or omitted by the licensee personally. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996)

Sec. 8-490. Suspension; Revocation Of License; Fines, Costs:

(a) Once a licensee has been notified of a violation of this article, they shall have five (5) days to file a written notice of appeal. If no hearing is requested, the Mayor **or designee** may suspend, revoke, or issue a written reprimand to any license issued under the provisions of this chapter, if the Mayor **or designee** determines that the licensee has violated any of the provisions of this article. In lieu of suspension or revocation of a license, the Mayor **or designee** may instead levy a fine on the licensee. The fine imposed shall not exceed seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) for each violation. Each day on which a violation continues shall constitute a separate violation.

(b) If no hearing is requested by the licensee and the Mayor determines that a letter of reprimand is warranted or the license should be suspended or revoked, he shall issue a written order within five (5) days stating the reasons for the determination, and shall cause a copy of such order to be served upon the licensee within ten (10) days. In the event a penalty is imposed, the order shall specify the date by which the penalty shall be paid. If the penalty is not paid by the specified date, the license shall be suspended for

a time determined by the Mayor or designee. All penalties shall be paid at police headquarters. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996)

Sec. 8-491. Hearing Procedures:

(a) If a hearing is requested, in writing, before the Code Hearing Officer, the Code Hearing Officer shall schedule a hearing on said matter within thirty (30) days. Said hearing shall be open to the public and a Court Reporter shall transcribe the proceedings.

(b) If the Code Hearing Officer determines that the licensee has violated any of the provisions of this chapter, the Code Hearing Officer may suspend, revoke or issue a written reprimand to any license issued under the provisions of this chapter or, in lieu of suspension or revocation of a license, impose a fine on the licensee not to exceed seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) for each violation. Each day on which a violation continues shall constitute a separate violation.

(c) The Code Hearing Officer shall determine the costs incurred by the City for said hearing, including, but not limited to: Court Reporter fees, the cost of transcript records, attorney fees, the cost of preparing the mailing notices and orders and all other miscellaneous expenses incurred by the City or such lesser sum as the Code Hearing Officer may allow.

(d) The licensee shall pay said costs to the City within thirty (30) days of notification of the costs by the Code Hearing Officer. Failure to pay said costs within thirty (30) days of notification is a violation of this article and may be cause for license suspension or revocation, or the levy of additional fines.

(e) Witnesses shall be sworn; but the hearing shall be informal, and the strict rules of evidence shall not apply.

(f) In the event the licensee wishes to appeal a decision of the Code Hearing Officer, said licensee shall pay the cost of the preparation and transcription of the record of the hearing and shall appeal to the Circuit Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Act. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996)

Sec. 8-492. Use Of Premises After Revocation:

(a) When any license shall have been revoked for any cause, no license shall be granted to said licensee for the period of six (6) months thereafter for the conduct of the business of selling "any products" as defined in this Chapter. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996)

Sec. 8-493. Prohibited Sales, Delivery - Signs:

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person, including any licensee, to sell, offer for sale, give away or deliver tobacco products, tobacco accessories, or alternative nicotine products to any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years.

(b) Signs informing the public of the age restrictions provided for herein shall be posted by every licensee at or near every display of tobacco products, tobacco accessories, or alternative nicotine products and on or upon every vending machine which offers tobacco products for sale. Each such sign shall be plainly visible and shall state:

**THE SALE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS, VAPING DEVICES, TOBACCO ACCESSORIES and
ALTERNATIVE NICOTINE PRODUCTS TO
PERSONS UNDER TWENTY-ONE YEARS OF
AGE IS PROHIBITED BY LAW.**

The text of such signs shall be in red letters on a white background, said letters to be at least one inch (1") high. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996)

Sec. 8-494. Age Limits

(a) Minimum Age To Sell Tobacco Products, Vaping Devices Tobacco Accessories, or Alternative Nicotine Products: It shall be unlawful for any licensee or any officer, associate, member, representative,

agent or employee of such licenses, to engage, employ or permit any person under twenty-one (21) years of age to sell **Tobacco Products, Vaping Devices, Tobacco Accessories, or Alternative Nicotine Products** in any licensed premises.

(b) Purchase Prohibited: It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of twenty-one (21) years to possess any **Tobacco Products, Vaping Devices, Tobacco Accessories, or Alternative Nicotine Products**, or to misrepresent their identity or age, or to use any false or altered identification for the purpose of purchasing tobacco products.

(c) Possession Prohibited: It shall be unlawful for any person under twenty-one (21) years of age to possess any Tobacco Products, **Vaping Devices Tobacco Accessories or Alternative Nicotine Products**.

Sec. 8-495. Certain Free Distributions Prohibited:

(a) It shall be unlawful for any licensee or any person in the business of selling or otherwise distributing, promoting or advertising tobacco products, **vaping devices, tobacco accessories, smoking herbs or alternative nicotine products**, or any employee or agent of any such licensee or person, in the course of such licensee's or person's business, to distribute, give away or deliver tobacco products, **vaping devices, tobacco accessories, smoking herbs or alternative nicotine products** free of charge to any person on any right of way, park, playground or other property owned by the city or the school district. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996)

Sec. 8-496. Vending Machines-Locking Devices:

(a) It shall be unlawful for any licensee to sell or offer for sale, give away, deliver or to keep with the intention of selling, giving away or delivering tobacco products **or alternative nicotine products** by use of a vending machine, unless such vending machine is equipped with a manual, electric or electronic locking device controlled by the licensee so as to prevent its operation by persons under the age of twenty-one (21) years.

(b) Any premises where access by persons under the age of twenty-one (21) years is prohibited, shall be exempt from the requirements of subsection (a) of this section. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996)

Sec. 8-497. Remedies For Violation:

Any violation of the provisions of this article, except as otherwise provided in this section, shall be punishable by a minimum fine of two hundred dollars (\$200.00). In the event any person is accused of a violation hereof and does not wish to contest the allegation prior to the time a complaint is issued for the violation, that person so accused may pay to the city at police headquarters a penalty in the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for and in full satisfaction of said violation.

~~—(b) Any violation committed by any person under the age of twenty-one (21) of subsection, as a first offense, shall be punishable by a minimum fine of fifty dollars (\$50.00). In the event any person is accused of a violation hereof and does not wish to contest the allegation prior to the time a complaint is issued for the violation, that person so accused may pay to the city at police headquarters a penalty in the sum of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) for and in full satisfaction of said violation. In lieu of any citation payment or any fine mentioned herein for the first offense, a person may notify the chief of police, in writing, of their intention to complete a "tobacco use" class or other similar class put on by the American Lung Association, at such person's sole cost and expense, and if such person shall successfully complete such class and provide proof of completion to the chief of police, in writing, then any such citation cost or fine for first offense shall be waived.~~

~~—(c) These fines are in addition to administrative provisions for suspension, revocation or forfeiture of a license issued pursuant to this article; and payment of such fine shall not constitute an admission of guilt or innocence for purposes of such administrative proceedings for suspension, revocation or forfeiture.~~

~~(d) Any duly appointed and authorized security officer for the School District #41 or any subdivision thereof, or any other peace officer, shall have authority to sign all complaints and charge any violations of this section that takes place on School District #41 property. Any duly appointed and authorized administrator for the Alleman High School or any subdivision thereof, or any other peace officer, shall have authority to sign all complaints and charge any violations of this section that takes place on Alleman school property. (Ord. 96-67, 9-16-1996; Ord. 96-83, 10-28-1996)~~

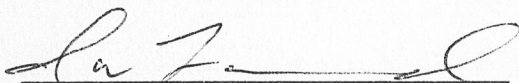

1. Call to Order

Mayor Thoms called the Study Session to order at 5:34 p.m.

2. Roll Call

Mayor Thoms asked City Clerk Samantha Gange to call the roll.

Present: Alderpersons Moses Robinson, Randy Hurt, Randy Tweet, Jenni Swanson, Dylan Parker and Mayor Mike Thoms.

Absent: Alderpersons Mark Poulos and Bill Healy.

Staff: City Manager Todd Thompson, Attorney Leslie Day, City Clerk Samantha Gange, and other City Staff.

3. Presentations

a. Presentation on Proposed Amendments to the Tobacco Ordinance.

City Attorney Leslie Day provided a detailed background on the timeline and progression of changes to the City's tobacco ordinance over the past several years. She said that in October 2024, the Council adopted a moratorium on vape shops through June 30, 2025.

Ms. Day provided background information on the potential regulation of hemp-derived THC products at the state level. She noted that 13 other states have adopted a regulatory framework for hemp products. Gov. Pritzker introduced a bill in January 2025 that would limit the sale of most hemp-derived products, but it stalled in the House. She discussed the possible enforcement challenges the City would face and noted the effectiveness of the ban would be minimal as it is offered by all of our surrounding communities, like Moline.

She discussed the challenges of regulating flavored tobacco products, including enforcement concerns as well as potential First Amendment issues. She emphasized the current lack of clear state or federal guidelines and the difficulty of local enforcement without a regulatory framework. She recommended that the City wait for the adoption of a regulatory framework at the state or federal level.

Clerk Gange provided an overview of the proposed changes to the tobacco ordinance. The proposed amendments include: revisions and additions to tobacco definitions; restrictions on vape product sales by reducing the sales threshold for Class B tobacco licenses (vape/specialty) to 50 percent and including a 20 percent threshold for floor/display space; limiting the number of Class A licenses (general retail/incidental) to 30 and limiting Class B licenses to 2; recommended \$50 fee adjustment for each license class; removal of outdated language and designate the City Council the authority to increase or decrease the number of tobacco licenses.

Attorney Day clarified that if a convenience store or vape shop closes or leaves, we will not have a license available, so it automatically reduces the number of licenses until the limit is achieved.

Alderperson Parker said he supports a flavored tobacco ban and a ban on hemp-derived THC products in the City. He noted he is sympathetic to having the staff and resources to enforce the bans and asked for further clarification. Clerk Gange noted the shortage in the police department and Attorney Day said there is difficulty with testing the hemp-derived THC and noted pending litigation with a municipality in Illinois who banned these products. She warned about banning hemp-derived THC products at this time, given the lack of regulatory framework and litigation risk.

Attorney Day said she would be more comfortable waiting to ban hemp-derived THC products until the state implements a regulatory framework. She suggested Council adopt the proposed amendments to the tobacco ordinance now, and she can begin researching and drafting language for a flavored-tobacco ban similar to Chicago's if that is the desire of council members.

Chief McCloud remarked that they are short staff, but could enforce tobacco regulations during their annual underage sales of tobacco checks.

b. Presentation on the Martin Lukther King Center Prevention Program.

MLK Director Jerry Jones introduced Carlos Jimenez and stated that they would be providing an overview of the MLK Prevention Program.

Mr. Jimenez then introduced Substance Abuse Prevention Specialist Adrianna Rubio and Teenage Pregnancy Prevention Specialist Adriana Blanco. He described the prevention program as a proactive, comprehensive educational initiative aimed at equipping young people with the knowledge, skills, and tools necessary to make informed decisions regarding substance use and teenage pregnancy. He outlined the program's evidence-based curriculum, which emphasizes the development of social skills, resistance to peer pressure, anti-drug attitudes, and education on mental, emotional, and sexual health.

Ms. Blanco shared recent data from Rock Island High School, noting that 24 percent of students were suspended during the 2023–2024 school year due to vaping and tobacco-related incidents. She also reported that the program has reached over 1,500 students to date.

The prevention team highlighted their community outreach efforts and outlined their goals for the 2025–2026 academic year. These include expanding research efforts, increasing the number of students served, staying up to date with best practices, and strengthening their partnership with the Rock Island-Milan School District.

Mr. Jimenez added that the program is active in junior high schools and referenced a recent survey indicating a concerning prevalence of vaping among junior high students.

Director Jones concluded by noting that the Illinois Department of Human Services provides both funding and support for the program.
